Religious Education

<u>Intent</u>

Here at Cheddington School, the principal aim of Religious Education is to enable pupils to explore the beliefs, values, practices and ways of life of the main religions, other faiths and non-religious world views. Children will be given opportunities to reflect on their own beliefs and attitudes and learn how our behaviour affects other people and the world we live in. Through a deep understanding of their own values and those of others, it will help pupils make sense of the wider world and their role within it, thus preparing them for adult life.

Implementation

At Cheddington School, the children follow the Buckinghamshire Agreed Syllabus for Religious Education (Challenging R.E. IV) through the Jigsaw RE Scheme. Their learning in RE is complimented through following the Jigsaw PSHE scheme.

In Reception, pupils will learn about aspects of religious and non-religious worldviews through the following activities :

- Exploring artefacts and clothing
- Religious stories
- Celebrations and festivals
- Dance
- Food
- Music
- Art
- Exploring feelings

Children will learn about Religious Education across the Foundation Stage Curriculum in more detail through these specific topics :

What makes people special?	What is Christmas?
How do people celebrate?	What is Easter?
What can we learn from stories?	What makes places special?

In Key Stages 1 and 2, pupils will explore religious and non-religious worldviews through a series of enquiries.

Religious Education at Cheddington is taught in discrete lessons which are planned sequentially to build on the children's existing knowledge, skills and experiences.

Children will be given opportunities to learn about the practices, beliefs and customs of the main religions and non-religious worldviews and consider the similarities and differences between these and their own lives.

They will have experience of handling religious artefacts and understand the importance of treating them sensitively and with respect.

Children will be given opportunities to visit places of worship within the local area.

They will be encouraged to reflect on their own learning in Religious Education and ask challenging questions about life and the wider world.

Teachers will enable pupils to use the correct terminology and vocabulary when learning about religions.

<u>Impact</u>

Lessons are engaging and challenging and provide children with opportunities to broaden their knowledge and experience of religious and non-religious worldviews.

Children feel confident to share their own views and beliefs and show sensitivity to the ideas of others.

They are able to treat others with respect, showing an understanding of how their actions and behaviour can affect others.

Children are well equipped morally, socially, emotionally and spiritually to make decisions on their journey through secondary school and into adult-life.
