This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Cheddington Combined School already publishes the school curriculum for music for each year group online. This includes how we are increasing access for disabled pupils and supporting pupils with special educational needs (SEND). Each child has an hour of music per week delivered by the class teachers. We follow the National Curriculum and use Charanga music throughout the school. Through this all pupils have opportunities to learn to sing and play an instrument during lesson time through whole-call ensemble teaching.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Cheddington Combined School offers music tuition outside of what is taught in lesson time, including one-to-one and small-group peripatetic music lessons.

Children can join our Cheddington School choir, which takes place at lunchtime every week. Our school choir often sings at our school church services.

Pupils can learn to play the violin, guitar, piano, drums and a variety of brass instruments through individual lessons provided by several peripatetic music teachers. Children work towards qualifications and awards in their instruments.

Parents pay for these directly in accordance with our Charging and Remissions Policy. Pupil Premium children are financially supported to access these lessons. Pupils who take these lessons have an opportunity to perform for their class mates and parents in the Summer Term at our end of year celebration evening.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Children sing in assembly regularly. Each academic year, we have a weekly singing assembly, musical performances, and class assemblies for parents. We have had theatre companies visit the school performing musical shows for all children at school.

For our class assemblies, each class learns and performs a range of songs. Year 2 perform a nativity each Christmas and Year 5 perform a musical linked to their learning. Year 6 perform a Leaver's Assembly with songs.

Each year children listen to live music when our peripatetic music teachers come into school to perform.

Each week in assembly the children listen to and learn about a different piece of music. These include a variety classical, modern and world music.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

In the academic year 2024 – 2025, we are taking our choir to perform at the Birmingham Arena as part of Young Voices.

Year 6 will be performing a Disney musical at the local secondary school as part of their transition.

We will be offering singing lessons in addition to our existing provision from our very talented peripatetic music teachers.

Our KS2 children will be going to a local theatre to see a pantomime. Our EY and KS1 children will have the opportunity to enjoy a live performance.
